WELCOME to the JULY/AUGUST issue of LINK



Since the last edition of LINK, reports of open conflict erupting between Israel and Iran have increased the concern caused by ongoing conflicts in the Middle East and Ukraine, as well as the unpredictable impact of American global policies. How do Christians, who believe in a God of love and peace, with good purposes for his

world, make sense of all this?

The Bible teaches that our Creator is good, wise and loving, and He's working out a plan for the world that leads, through faith in Christ, to a future renewing of this world. The concept of "heaven" as an airy-fairy afterlife with nothing much going on, doesn't come close to doing this justice; the biblical promise is of a New Creation, just as physical and fulsome as this world, but with all the flaws and failures washed away; heaven on earth, if you like.

But it is also relentlessly honest about the human propensity to hurt one another and the wider world. This is encouraging, because it means Christian faith is not mere wish-fulfilment; rather it recognises there is a serious problem – summed up in the concept of sin – but that God has sent someone to defeat this problem, in His Son.

Like all good heroic tales, there are ups and downs and each of us has a heroic role to play, whether that be sharing the good news of Christ with others, or standing for what is right in a difficult season – perhaps by writing to your MP or donating to a good cause, or simply by holding on to the hope that Christ presents, which we strengthen in our daily life of prayer and Bible, and joining with God's people in services of worship. How might you express hope in Christ today?

On Wednesday 21st May we held our first meeting in the Memorial Hall. We welcomed local carers who were curious to find out all about us and were joined by Cllr Fran Carpenter who wholeheartedly supports our initiative. Earlier we met members of the Parish Council who were equally encouraging.

We understand that caring for someone can be a real challenge both physically and emotionally, especially at low moments. These meetings are being crafted with that in mind, providing a little oasis once a month where carers can enjoy personal quality time, just for themselves. The pressure and demands of being a part-time or full-time carer can sometimes seem daunting so we would love those attending to feel they can gain knowledge and friendship in the brief time we have together each month.

We have an information hub where carers can find out about the support that is available locally for themselves and for their cared-for person. If a carer is facing any specific challenges we can signpost to charities, health professionals and other experts. APCM Report 2025

At the meeting of the parishioners on May 11th, June Bailey and Jane Stocker were elected as Churchwardens. Phil thanked Duncan for his eight years of unstinting service as Churchwarden. At the Annual Parochial Church meeting, the following were elected to serve for three years on the PCC: Gill Morris, Mark Strode, Mary Moynagh, Liz Wyatt. Tony Edmonds was elected to Deanery Synod.

This year the Electoral Roll was renewed and now has 117 names on it, 66 people living in the parish and 51 outside the parish.

In his Treasurer's report, Tony Edmonds explained he was working to simplify the account structure, and to balance our books. The statement of Financial Activities shows Incoming resource is up on last year BUT in January, the PCC acknowledged that we are likely to see costs increase by some 5%. We are monitoring energy usage, but we need to see an increase on last year's income between $\mathfrak{L}6k$ to $\mathfrak{L}8k$ to remain in balance. Across the first 4 months, our general expenditure has gone up 6%, but Praise God, our giving and your generosity has pushed up the income by 12% – we are in a good place, but not complacent!

In his Fabric report, Duncan highlighted many areas where the fabric of our buildings has been maintained and improved by specialist trades people together with a host of volunteers.

In his Chairman's report, the Vicar addressed the two trials currently running at All Saints, as recommended by the services Review group. The evening service is to be reviewed by the PCC in July, along with the trial to move the 10.30 service to the hall for an extra Sunday each month.

He highlighted the benefits Anya has brought and said 'One year on it is a joy to see how well she has taken responsibility for the various ministries within our church, as well as the local schools.' He highlighted the Holiday Bible Club in February. Anya's funding comes solely from the ringfenced pot that is due to run out two years from now so the PCC will be looking at all avenues to enable Anya to remain with us.

Simon Hones joined in the last year as Associate Vicar and Phil has been greatly encouraged by his ministry wisdom as they have met together over the last 8 months.

In the Vision Review process three projects were identified. Last autumn we purchased a new sound system, primarily for use in the memorial hall, but also mobile. We have also committed to a scheme of minor works to improve the décor in All Saints Foyer. Also nearing fruition is the renovation of the kitchen at St Andrew's Hall.

Phil finished his report with all that the church does in promoting contact with our local community. He thanked those who run all the varied activities.

Thank you Anne for sharing these very personal thoughts with us. She wrote this 'non-poem' following the death of her son some eleven years ago, and offers it now in case it helps anyone else who is going through similar feelings.



Tim Cosby, our Bible Society representative, has recommended an interview from the Canadian Bible Society on Youtube (link below.) It is an inspiring interview given by an amazing man.

Anatoliy Raychynets, the deputy Bible Society Secretary in Ukraine, recently spoke about life for a military pastor during the war. To date over 1.2 million Bibles have been distributed by Bible Society. Anatoliy spoke of how his clerical collar opens doors to enable him to reach out to people. Almost everyone has been touched by the war.

His two children spend more time in bomb shelters than in class. His life involves often visiting the morgue and he notices that a majority who come to the morgue have a very small hope that it is not their son/husband/brother – but too often it is. Yet here the Bible became alive. When a parent has had her only son killed 'what can I tell them' he thinks. He asks God to give him the words and tells her – she has a heavenly father who loves her - and suggests that he read to them from the Bible. From Psalm 23 - the Lord is my shepherd – touches her heart and she breaks down in gratitude to him for sharing that passage and caring.

Before the war people didn't have Bibles but are seeking something spiritual now. On trains carrying troops, volunteers are distributing Bibles and discussing their faith.

He cites examples of people's needs – sometimes they need a hug, sometimes it is words and sometimes it is a Bible. He talks of vans arriving in war torn areas – some bring bread, while another brings boxes of Bibles.

Anatoliy says his strength comes from Bible reading and prayer. He has never seen such a need for Bibles since the Soviet Union collapsed in the early 1990s. He cited an example of a soldier he met who said he has never been so happy and peaceful even in the trenches since finding faith. Even his family notice the difference.

Plant for Pollinators URGENTLY!

What are pollinators?

Bees, butterflies, moths, insects, beetles, birds, bats...

Why are they so important?

They facilitate the transfer of pollen from the male part of the flower (anther) to the female part (stigma). Pollination is crucial for plants to produce fruit, seeds, vegetables, nuts, and more plants.

Pollinators have seriously declined - why?

Causes include: loss of suitable habitat, effects of climate change, use of pesticides, change of land use,

This decline is bad news for us and the eco system. We can help to put this right by planting **plants loved by pollinators** in our gardens:

lavender, single-petaled zinnias, echinacea, cornflowers, cosmos, aster, buddleia, allium, borage, sunflower, honeysuckle, oxeye daisy, native bluebell, foxgloves...

To help breathe life into God's Creation, and for the sake of our food source, let's get planting for pollinators!

The King marks 80th anniversary of Mission Aviation Fellowship and celebrates 50th anniversary of Papua New Guinea's independence



The King has visited the humanitarian air operator, Mission Aviation Fellowship (MAF), to celebrate their 80th anniversary. Whilst visiting the charity, His Majesty unveiled their new aircraft that will deliver aid to remote regions in Papua New Guinea and had the opportunity to meet members of the PNG community in celebration of their 50th anniversary of independence.

MAF, believed to be the world's largest humanitarian air operator, was founded at the end of the Second World War by a group of RAF officers. They wished to use the flight skills they had acquired in wartime to build a world in peace.

Today, MAF flies to 14,000 remote destinations to deliver support to isolated communities including access to medicine, technology and education.

His Majesty also unveiled the new Cessna aeroplane which will deliver aid to remote regions in Papua New Guinea. The plane has been modified to withstand some of the world's most challenging flying conditions.



Papua New Guinea is now MAF's busiest programme, and is recognised by the government, international aid agencies and local communities as a vital, safe service and a reliable way to travel. MAF has made a conscious commitment to the long-term development of the country by employing and training around 100 local staff.

The Quiet Revival

Gen Z leads massive rise in Church attendance



Church attendance has risen by 50% over the last six years.

The findings come in The Quiet Revival, a survey commissioned by the Bible Society and conducted by YouGov.

- Over 2m more people go to church now than six years ago (particularly in Roman Catholic and Pentecostal churches.)
- 16% of 18 24-year-olds are attending church.
- More men go to church than women.

Church, Civic and Charity Leaders come together to pray for the City of Southampton





The first Lord Mayor's Prayer Breakfast in five years has been held in Southampton. It was held in the Mayor's Parlour in the Civic Centre and brought together leaders from churches of all denominations, council leaders and local charities to pray for God's blessing on the city, its residents and decision makers.

Lord Mayor of Southampton Cllr James Baillie said, "I think it's a very important opportunity to get Christians in the city together to pray for the city, particularly near the start of the civic year, and especially here in the Civic Centre, which is a place where decisions that affect hundreds of thousands of people are made. As a Christian, I believe it's important that prayer should be a part of civic life, and to ask God to help the decisions we make."

Bishop Rhiannon said, "I just think it's wonderful to get together all these church leaders and others including people from the council. We're all here at the invitation of the Lord Mayor to pray for the city and for the wider world today. It's just great that people are meeting together today. I think God loves it and something special happens in the heavenlies."


