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WELCOME to the MARCH/APRIL issue of LINK



I may have gotten ahead of the season last month with my reflection on Easter eggs! I was prompted by their prominence in the supermarkets from Boxing Day. It has become part of the backdrop of our lives that the shops are constantly trying to get us excited to spend on the next big thing but I find the opposite is true: seeing barbecue

gear appear on the first sunny (but still very chilly) day in spring does not make we want to get grilling, and Easter Eggs in January mean any sense of anticipation for the moment of Easter is numbed by overexposure.

Make no mistake, Easter should be a moment, an event - and one characterised by excitement. Over three days, the followers of Jesus saw their leader, in whom they had invested all their hopes for life and peace, seemingly utterly defeated on the cross, only to experience the most dramatic reversal of fortunes when they find his tomb empty on the morning of the third day.

The gospel writers make clear how confused and troubled the eyewitnesses to the resurrection really were, so unexpected was the event. They had come to see Jesus as a champion of God's people in a tug of war with their enemies, gaining a little ground here, losing a little there. So when Jesus was killed, it looked like game over and it was truly astounding when Jesus returned to them and declared his 'defeat' to be a victory in a much bigger battle, a battle with sin and death.

In our world today we see many influential figures using their power to oppress and even destroy others. The hope of Easter is that even when these forces seem to be growing stronger, their ultimate defeat has already been guaranteed by Christ's death and resurrection. Chocolate may well be a wonderful way of celebrating this victory, but let's not lose sight of just how astonishing it really is!

Holy Week and Easter



Palm Sunday is the first day of Holy Week and celebrates Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem on a donkey. Crowds of people came out of the city to greet him, throwing down palm branches on the road. Anglican and Roman Catholic churches give out small crosses made from palm leaves, as a reminder of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem and his death on the cross.

On **Maundy Thursday** Christians remember when Jesus ate the Passover meal with his disciples, breaking bread and drinking wine. Christians refer to this meal as the Last Supper, recalling it in Holy Communion.

Good Friday is a day of mourning in church as it commemorates the execution of Jesus by crucifixion. In some countries, there are special Good Friday processions, or re-enactments of the Good Friday story.

Easter Sunday marks the amazing resurrection of Jesus. After Jesus was crucified on the Friday his body was taken down from the cross and buried in a cave tomb. The tomb was guarded by Roman soldiers and an enormous stone was put over the entrance. On Sunday Mary Magdalene and some of the disciples visited the tomb and they found the stone had been moved and that Jesus' body had gone. Jesus was seen later that day by Mary and the disciples and for forty days afterwards by many people. His followers realised that God had raised Jesus from the dead.

Luke tells us in his gospel 'why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here, he has risen!' That same power is available today through the Holy Spirit for everyone.

Burns Supper 25th January 2025

Every year on or around 25th January, Scots around the globe celebrate the birthday of Robert Burns, the immortal Bard. Happily, those without Scottish heritage are also included in this celebration and St. Andrew's Church congregation were pleased to host a commemoration of this auspicious birthday.



The traditional Burn's Supper follows a prescribed format. The evening begins with the Piping in of the Haggis, and though we had no piper, the recorded tune served just as well. Having the Haggis duly delivered to the serving table it was addressed with the customary words of greeting by Douglas Pryde and the carving of the "Great Chieftain o' the Pudding race" began. To accompany this delight, dishes of Tatties and Neeps (mashed potatoes and swede) were served, and each diner was given "gravy", actually Scotch whiskey, to pour on the meal. The traditional Selkirk Grace was delivered by Anne Hilton. (Some, who were unable or unwilling to partake of the Haggis, were served with a wonderfully fragrant chicken casserole.)

The second course consisted of delicious frozen desserts, all home made by Douglas Pryde. Before tea and coffee, Colin McMurtry toasted the immortal memory. He gave us a short history of Burns' colourful, though short, life. Interestingly Burns' riding around the countryside while working for the Excise caused complaints concerning the poor state of the roads. Plus ca change!

Our final entertainment of the evening was a spirited reading of Ode to a Louse given by Anne McMurtry and our gastronomic delights were completed by melt in the mouth chocolates made by Kate Pryde.

We need to remember that faith as small as a mustard seed can move mountains when faced with some task that seems beyond us.

Candle flames dance in a draught but despite the dancing they go on burning and illuminating. So, when we face opposition we need to go on resisting the temptation to yield and stand firm.

There is a stillness in the light of a candle flame at times. We need to find the same stillness and quiet to hear God speaking to us and so we can hear. That may be in our Bible reading, our quiet times, perhaps during a sermon!

When the wick burns itself out and there is no more glow we are reminded of how much we need to beefed by prayer, the Bible, worshipping God with others and in the fellowship we share.

Hardest of all is when the wick needs to be trimmed in order to burn more brightly. Sometimes God needs to prune us of what is unnecessary in our lives. It can be a painful process but once the experience is past our flame burns more brightly in the world around us. We can better share the love of God, his light and hope around us.

LINK has, for several years now, been released free to the community. It costs over £3,000 each year to print 11 editions. In the last couple of years the advertising income has dropped off considerably, leaving a significant shortfall.

In the light of this, the PCC has taken the decision to reduce the number of editions we print this year to bi-monthly, in order to address this problem. We did not take this decision lightly. While we make this immediate change, we will be looking at ways to bolster our advertising income and exploring all avenues to re-establish the usual pattern, whilst considering what the long term future of LINK looks like.

We need your help with this. In order to better understand the value of LINK, we need to know more about our readers and their views. In the coming months we may well include a survey in LINK; please do respond to this when it comes. In the meantime, feel free to communicate with the editor via the Church Office with any initial feedback you wish to offer.

I understand that LINK is valued by a significant group of people and I invite you to join me as I pray for a solution to be found to sustain its future place within our community.

Condensed from the Winchester Diocesan weekly newsletter:



On 14th July 2022 fire devastated All Saints' Church, Mudeford, just three years after its 150th anniversary. The fire destroyed all but a few walls of the church.

Plans to rebuild All Saints' started straight away. In the last 2½ years church members and the community have been working

hard to restore the church. Remains of the building were stabilised and architects were appointed. Relevant permissions have been obtained from the council and diocese. The final tenders for the work were sent out at the end of last month. It's taken hundreds of hours of work, discussion and prayer. Now a fundraising appeal has been launched to raise the shortfall of just over £300,000.

Revd Kathy Hicken was welcomed to the River Mude Benefice in 2024. She said, "It's been a great privilege to join All Saints' in the middle of their planning for the rebuild. We've just celebrated 150 years and it's such a privilege to be in the position of shaping a church for the future."

It's hoped a contractor can be appointed in April, with the first brick being laid in May. It's thought the re-building work will take 12 to 18 months to complete.

Revd Kathy added, "I think our heart is that it will be a real home for the whole community, that everyone who comes will feel the presence of God and will feel loved and feel safe and be able to share their struggles and their joys. It's a place to share life together with our community. Our heart is for it to be a village hub, a centre where everyone can come and experience God and just have that sense of community together."

Green Home Strategies That WILL Save You Money

This month Debbie and Tony from our Eco Church team had a FREE home thermal survey from the Greening Campaign Team in Hordle. They say 'We're quite pleased with the results and wanted to share the strategies we've



adopted to reduce our fuel bills with our church family and neighbours. Below are a few low-cost actions and DIY steps taken over the last 18 months to conserve energy and noticeably reduce our outlay'.

- 1. Install reflective foil behind radiators
- 2. Service your central heating boiler annually
- 3. Reduce the water temperature on your boiler setting by one degree
- 4. Reduce your home thermostat setting by one degree
- 5. Bleed all radiators regularly
- 6. Check settings on radiator thermostats for your daily living needs
- 7. Use draught excluder tape around leaky windows or doors
- 8. Make or buy draught excluders for the bottom of draughty doors
- 9. Wear warm layers of clothing and wear a light hat indoors
- 10. Add thermal linings to curtains and close them at the end of the afternoon
- 11. Boil the water you need and don't overfill your kettle
- 12. If using the main oven, cook several things at the same time
- 13. Use an air fryer for roasting as it uses much less energy than the oven
- 14. Switch off appliances when not in use.
