WELCOME to the NOVEMBER edition of LINK



As November opens we will gather at the memorials in our villages to remember those who have laid down their lives in the defence of peace, in the World Wars and in military service to this day. In recent years these services across the country have seen a surge in commitment and attendance. Perhaps, conscious as we are of the worrying persistence of conflict in eastern Europe and the Middle East, we are yearning more than ever for the hope of peace to become a reality.

The month will draw to a close with the arrival of the season of Advent, when in our churches we will start to declare the Christmas news heralded by angels to shepherds: ***“Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace to those on whom his favour rests.”***

These angelic words contain a jaw-dropping promise. ***Peace on earth***. They do not speak of some airy-fairy hope that after the chaos of this life there might be some ethereal afterlife of nothing much - peace as an absence of conflict, or of anything else exciting.

No, the Christian concept of peace is drawn from the Old Testament Hebrew word *shalom*, which refers to the fullest expression of life, joy and vitality a person or a culture can experience, ‘the world, all as it should be’ as one famous Christian song puts it.

And the angels declare this peace will be found *on earth*. Christian hope is unashamedly earthy, with the last chapter of the Bible story picturing a real, physical world made completely new and imperishable, with all stain of death and sadness wiped away. Many find such a hope hard to believe in, perhaps too good to be true. But for those who do have faith, it strengthens our resolve to stand firm against those forces that would kill and destroy, knowing that we stand in line with our Lord who laid down His life to do the same, and who received His life back again in the ultimate victory over evil.

So I will be proud to honour the memory of those in our villages who have laid down their lives in the same cause, and I am sure I will see many of you there.

Our greatest crisis yet in flood-stricken Nepal

“The Leprosy Mission’s flagship hospital in Nepal is in a state of emergency after record monsoon rains lashed the Kathamandu valley.



On the morning of 28 September the downpours gave way to deadly landslides at Anandaban. Staff suffer flashbacks of buildings and trees cascading down the mountainside in a torrent of mud. Overnight roads turned to rivers. Only the army was able to reach Anandaban Hospital.

It was a desperate situation. Borewells supplying the hospital with water were damaged. This left the hospital without a fresh water supply. We were acutely aware there was just a day or two of water left stored in tanks. Food supplies were rapidly dwindling. There was a real danger of the entire hospital campus needing to be evacuated. But how could this even happen with every road blocked?

We are relieved that it has not been necessary, so far, to evacuate the hospital site. This is despite more rainfall. Instead, patients have been moved from the wards to the new main hospital building for safety. Temporary repairs have successfully restored the hospital's water and electricity supply. Emergency food supplies have reached the hospital.

In my darker moments this week, I have been comforted that Anandaban means 'forest of joy' in Nepali. My heart was somehow lifted by this simple encouragement. Although the current disaster is undoubtedly its greatest crisis yet, we are not without hope.

For decades Anandaban has been a beacon of hope to so many patients affected by leprosy. For many it is only the only place they are loved, accepted and cared for free of charge.

Thank you so much for reading this and for caring. If you would like to give to keep the beacon of light that is Anandaban shining, please go to our website. It is our prayer that the hospital and all its services will be fully restored and reinstated soon. The mountaintop hospital can then shine brighter than ever before.”

Whilst on holiday in Yorkshire earlier in the year, Chris and Janice Benson visited Upper Wharfedale and Littondale Parish Church. They brought back a copy of that church's magazine - LINK!

In that LINK, the Vicar, Revd Tom Lusty, wrote about his Christian journey, and concluded his letter with 'one of his favourite prayers' from

THOUGHTS FROM MY GARDEN ...

As the Editor remarked last month, the sweet peas have been amazing this year! I think the weather suited them and we gave them extra water when necessary. Also they like regular picking and we picked a big bunch every day. There were often four vases in the lounge full of sweet peas. The Michaelmas daisies are looking good at the moment, as are the alstroemeria which are currently in pots but I think I will plant them out.



I always forget to plant the garlic for next year until I am reminded by my daughter. The cloves are in now, although I had to go to three garden centres to find them.

I have started to feed fat balls to the birds to help them through the winter. The hedgehog is still coming to feed every evening. I must think about a house for when he or she wants to hibernate. It will be drier under cover.

We have been watching two squirrels busy in the garden, hiding conkers. One has just passed the window with a conker in its mouth! I have already found three conkers, one in the ground and two in pots when I removed the trailing geraniums to the greenhouse for the winter. I can see I will be finding horse chestnut trees growing when I start gardening next year!

BIBLE SOCIETY IN UKRAINE

For more than 600 days, Bible Society colleagues in Ukraine have been taking aid, medicine and the Bible to people across the country, and increasingly to areas of fighting.

Recently, Deputy General Secretary Anatoliy Raychynets returned from a trip to visit troops on the front line in woods outside Bakhmut where they met soldiers who were manning a cannon, but also reading Psalm 91. Anatoliy leads Bible outreach in Ukraine, taking God's word to the front lines, and Victoria leads the country's Bible-based trauma healing programme. Both efforts bring Jesus into desperate situations, and it's the generosity of Bible Society supporters, who gave a million pounds in 2022, that makes it all possible.

'We were interrupted by shell explosions,' said Anatoliy. 'When I found myself in a trench next to a soldier called Kyrlyo, he told me that two weeks ago we had come and given him a Bible.'

Kyrlyo told him: 'I have never been to church, never read the Bible, because I never had one. Here, at the combat positions, in short moments of silence, I started reading prayers from the Book of Psalms, as you advised me back then.

'I feel warmth inside me while reading. I have never experienced anything like this in my life. I realised that it was God who came to me, a sinner, at the age of 57. He came here, to the swamp, to the horrors of the war, to find me. Thank you for the Bible. It revived me to a new life, a life with God.' Then Kyrlyo asked Anatoliy to pray with him.

'A few minutes later, when everything has quieted down, we continued reading Psalm 91. My voice was a bit hoarse because it was -10 in the forest and I was quite cold,' said Anatoliy.

Anatoliy says: 'God works in an amazing way. His word is alive and active. Thank you that we have Bibles and are able to give them to people in different circumstances.'



No.3 in Angie's series on the Church's Calendar

Epiphany- had a moment?

Is this a familiar phrase to you? A definition of epiphany is a sudden understanding or realisation. It is often used to describe a moment of insight or comprehension that leads to a new understanding of something. Epiphanies can be profound and life-changing, or they can be little insights that help us see things in a new way.



In the Christian tradition, the time between December 25 and January 6 is known as the Twelve Days of Christmas and this ends with the festival of Epiphany. In Rome, by 354 Christ's birth was being celebrated on December 25th, and later the church in Rome

began celebrating Epiphany on January 6. In the Western church the festival primarily commemorates the visit by the Magi to the infant Jesus, which is seen as evidence that Christ, the Jewish Messiah, came also for the salvation of Gentiles.

This prayer can be used during Epiphany to express something of the story and significance of the Wise Men who brought gifts to the infant Jesus.

“God of surprises and gifts, you revealed yourself as a newborn baby and, with a star, you led the peoples of earth to worship Jesus, your only Son: lead us to see you face-to-face, and help us to discover our gifts and talents so that we may offer them up to you and your service. Let us be Jesus’ light in the world today. Amen.”

This prayer from New Zealand highlights our response to Epiphany.

“O God among us, may we be visited by angels, may we follow stars, may we bring the gifts we have to offer. May we embrace the journey and travel in love. May Christ bless our homes and find a home in our hearts throughout the year. Amen.”

Rio Grande do Sul - Brazil's most southerly state - is experiencing its worst ever climate change catastrophe caused by the unprecedented rainfall earlier this year.

With authorities calling it the worst climate disaster in southern Brazil, the state's federal government announced on 22 August that it would release R\$1.97 billion to help pay off debts to rural producers whose livelihoods have been ruined. The state has a land mass larger than the UK, with more than 90% of the area having been affected by unprecedented rainfall since April.

Low-lying areas of the state's capital Porto Alegre are completely under water. The River Guaíba rose to a record 5.33 metres. It's believed a total of 600,000 people were made homeless and 45,000 businesses affected by the disaster with electricity, roads and drinking water all badly affected. In response, MAF affiliate Asas de Socorro (ADS) has delivered over 1,000kg of life-saving aid supplies to flooded communities, as well as transporting health professionals and performing medevacs.

'The aerial view was devastating,' said ADS Pilot Victor Scarparo. 'We saw submerged neighbourhoods and collapsed lives. It's in this moment that the magnitude of the tragedy and importance of our air mission becomes clear.' The under-reported disaster continues to take its toll and highlight the grave impacts climate change is having on the most vulnerable communities.
